Toni Lynn Absher Libhart taught band and orchestra grades 5 through 12 in the Wichita Public Schools for 13 years and

served as the instrumental music teaching specialist for two years. Her bands and orchestras consistently received First Division ratings. High school select percussion ensembles under Libhart's direction have received national awards at competitions across the United States.

Libhart performed as an alternate percussionist in the Wichita Symphony Orchestra for more than 20 years.

Many of her private percussion students have been all-state players in high school. Several university percussion students have gone on to complete graduate degrees.

Libhart has a published marimba arrangement of "Elite Syncopations" by Scott Joplin. She plays percussion and directs the orchestra at Central Christian Church. Libhart has been a member of the National Association for Music Education since her freshman year in college.

She faithfully taught at Friends University for over 30 years before retiring last year. She is married and has two stepdaughters and three grandchildren. Her life verse is Jeremiah 29:11.

His Eye Is On the Sparrow

I started this arrangement about 1979 and completed it in October of 2021.

Yellow After the Rain by Mitchell Peters

This is a great beginning 4 mallet piece because it uses most techniques involved in playing 4 mallet literature. It was my first mallet piece and I have used it over the years for many students.

Elite Syncopations

Scott Joplin wasa composer and pianist. He is known as the "King of ragtime" because of the fame achieved for his ragtime compositions. His music was born out of Afrian-American heritage. He wrote over 100 original ratime pieces, one ragtime ballet and two operas.

I published this arrangement and played it on both my junior and senior undergrad recitals. Arraning something for 4 mallets that was originally written for 10 fingers definitely increases the difficulty level. Because I was not happy with my performanced of this piece over 40 years ago, I decided to try to conquer it on this recital.

Concerto for Marimba and Orchestra

This Brazilian composer and percussionist specializes in music for percussion. His first concerto was composed in 1986 and uses Brazilian and jazz elements along with mixed meter and contemporary harmonies. The traditional fast-slow-fast pattern is augmented by an instered third movement called "Dance" which prepares the final "Farewell" and balances the long central "Lament" which displays the wide variety of textures and sounds available to the mallet soloist.

I taught this piece to a Friends student about 1990 and really liked the piece. I have intended to learn it ever since then and after retirement in May of this year, I decided to work on two movements and that led to learning all four movements. Notice the final movement is called "Farewell" so this is my farewell retirement recital.

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
