RABBIT HOLE SEP 30 - OCT 2, 2022

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We're given an in-depth look into a family home's private life in rebuilding after a tragedy. A perspective we don't always get to see. The air of tension will be accompanied by a wash of reassurance, knowing that no family has it figured out. After the unexpected death of Becca and Howie's 4-year-old son, Danny, the family dynamic is damaged. We take a front-row seat to how one loss can impact these characters differently and how grief isn't a moment in time but rather a constant presence.

Grieving is the active process of piecing together life after loss. The characters in the show don't settle in their grief; they wrestle with it. The hurt of loss rears its head in moments when you least expect it—causing us to distance ourselves and lash out at loved ones. While grief can become a place of comfort, it can prohibit us from experiencing the current moment's joy. Though we want to linger on these deeply felt emotions because it's comfortable and safe, we're losing the most valuable gift of all....time. Time to spend with loved ones, time to celebrate, times of laughter, times of peace.

Even though the mind and heart stay on what we lost, time continues to move. It's a harsh reality of life. The only thing we can ask ourselves is, "What will we do as time continues to move" How can we take what we've experienced into our future? How will we allow tragedy to impact us? Rabbit Hole is a play about reclaiming and reestablishing one's identity after tragedy strikes. This production is not to belabor the loss of Howie and Becca's son but to honor their love for him by their choice to move forward, which is no easy feat.

Grief is not just the concept of death; it's the idea of loss—the loss of birthdays, time, support, and opportunity. I encourage you to look at grief as a constant presence that influences our perception of the world and, in return, our choices. Throughout this production, you will experience humans expressing some of the most profound, unfiltered thoughts and feelings of their hearts; In ways that use harsh language, ask invasive questions, challenge the presence of a higher power, and question reality as we know it.

I hope you experience this show with listening ears, patient minds, and open hearts.
