

DIRECTOR'S NOTE

Friends University is excited to share the witty and eccentric music of French composer, Erik Satie (born May 17, 1866, died July 1, 1925). Throughout his life, he flouted convention, styling a music that has influenced generations of composers around the world. The focal point of our celebration has been a piece he composed in 1893, entitled Vexations. This relatively unassuming work was not performed until 1963, due to Satie's instruction that the performer repeat it 840 times in a row. Our celebration of Vexations took place earlier today, the first time it has been performed by multiple pianists simultaneously throughout a city. Vexations is also the music you've been listening to as we ready the stage for tonight's performance!

The program you will hear tonight highlights Satie's most well-known works for the piano, alongside music of his contemporaries. Our goal is to entertain, educate, and embody the timeless spirit and humor of his music; we hope you enjoy!

Thank you for joining us in our celebration of the music of Satie, the time period in which he lived, and specifically the idiosyncratic piece Vexations, which was performed for the first time in Kansas earlier today.

It has been our joy to dive into this music and to gain more of an understanding of the mind of Satie and the period in which he lived. He was one of the most original composers who ever lived and much of his music anticipates certain trends in music that only came into full fruition many years later. The members of Les Six were certainly influenced by the simplicity of his writing, and looking further ahead, the composer John Cage was also deeply influenced.

As strange a personality as he was, he still gave us a legacy of very beautiful music and also a new way of looking at music that continues to inspire today.

A native of Wichita, Kansas, **Dr. James Knight** won the Naftzger Piano Award and the Kansas Cultural Trust Award enabling him to study in New York City with Constance Keene. Dr. Knight was a finalist in the Leschetizky Piano Competition and also performed at Steinway Hall in New York City. Dr. Knight is now in his 29th year of teaching at Friends University, where he is an assistant professor of piano. He has also had several prizewinning students in local competitions including the WMMTA piano concerto auditions. Dr. Knight's compositions are published by SMP Press.



Inspired by the music of our time, pianist **Nathanael May** seeks to enlighten audiences with innovative performances, initiatives, and outreach. He was named the 2012 Winner of the American Prize for solo piano performance and enjoys bringing neglected and interesting music to the public sphere. Nathanael is founder of the soundSCAPE Composition And Performance Exchange, a festival that unites young composers and performers every summer in the Swiss Alps. He serves as the Tim & Gail Buchanan endowed chair for the Fine Arts division at Friends University.



Cindy Blasdel received her BM in Piano Performance from Friends University and her MM in Accompanying from Wichita State University. She has travelled internationally as an accompanist. Since coming to Friends, Cindy has taught Music Theory and Aural Skills, private and class piano, vocal jazz and accompanied Singing Quakers, Concert Choir and numerous soloists.
